My family and I are honored and humbled to be a part of Combat Logistics Regiment 2. The regiment’s Unit, Personal, and Family Readiness Program (UPFRP) is designed to build and maintain a team that achieves high operational readiness—a key tenet in our ability to “Fight tonight—and win!”

The UPFRP encompasses every member of the regiment as well as their families. Personal and family readiness is the ability of the individual Marine, Sailor, and family to successfully balance the challenges of the Marine Corps lifestyle with their family, their career, and the mission of the unit.

Our personal and family readiness program will provide the foundational support that will ensure our Marines, Sailors, and their loved ones can not only withstand, but thrive under the rigors and challenges they may face. The Marine Corps has numerous resources for family member support. Our UPFRP is here to help all Marines, Sailors, and those closest to them navigate resources and connect with the right service at the right time.

We have two assigned Deployment Readiness Coordinators (DRC) at CLR 2: Ms. Nadia Wright and Mr. Jeffrey Peters. They will help facilitate the UPFRP that will enhance the mission readiness of the regiment and support the four tenets of the UPFRP: Official Communication, Readiness and Deployment Support, Readiness and Resource Support, and Volunteer Management.

COMMUNICATION: E-mail messages from me—or on my behalf—are our direct official means of communication and will be disseminated to the Marines, Sailors, spouses, family members, and/or loved ones. All Marines must submit a NAVMC 11654 form to our DRCs and update the Family Readiness Module in Marine Online (MOL) to provide contact information and authorize communication.

READINESS AND DEPLOYMENT SUPPORT: We must train and educate Marines, Sailors, and family members to manage the stress of potential deployment and separation—as well as equip families with tools to build life skills to continue the mission in our absence.

INFORMATION AND REFERRAL: Our DRCs are our information, resource and referral specialists...if you have a request or need assistance, please ask! We can provide the tools to help make you a successful and resilient Marine Corps family.

VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT: Our DRCs and unit leaders work with non-appointed volunteers to plan, coordinate, and execute specific unit morale events. We will actively collaborate and coordinate with our Single Marine (and Sailor) Program via appointed representatives. I fully expect every Marine and Sailor to participate in our program—contribute to the team and our success; you are individually accountable for your personal and family readiness. I also charge leaders at all levels to recognize the importance of involvement in our Family Readiness Program.
